hicle on a crisp early Monday morning just outside the visitor centre in Clear Lake, I was swept away by the sweet smell of the forest. I was awaiting the arrival of Celes Davar, founder of Earth Rhythms, a hands- on approach to wildlife and the discovering of the natural beauty of Riding Mountain National Park. Davar has been running Earth Rhythms since 1996, and has been involved with Parks Canada for over for reasons I cannot explain, 25 years.

After jumping in his Ford Escape Hybrid (Davar is huge on doing all we can to help the environment), we took off down a winding road to take in the Park in all its glory. Davar's first instructions were to stop the car, roll down the windows and just listen. Eagerly, I awaited something magnificent, but heard nothing, or so I thought. "Do you hear that?" Davar asked me excitedly, and since I didn't, I listened closer. "It's alive!"

Having listened closer I was now aware of birds chirping very softly, the slow rustle of leaves and you could almost hear the glistening of the lake. "This is what people hunger for, something more universal than the usual urban noise you beautiful creation?

Carrying on down the road we come across very abundent cranberry bushes, sprinklings of hoary puccoons (which are wildflowers) and yellow lady slippers. We then pulled over to do some bird listening. Very intensely Davar listens to the sounds the birds are making. He whips out an iPhone and begins to search iBird Pro which is an application that allows you to search every species of bird imaginable, read up on the them and then play their call. This was so fascinating to me.


playing an Ovenbird's call, we listened for him to call back and he did more loudly this time. Next, another bird joined in, it was a Red Eyed Vireo. Both birds had beautiful calls, and the iBird tool was fun to use with both of them.

When returning to the vehicle, we spotted a lone gosling wandering down the road toward us. We listened carefully to his desperate cries and watched his bobbing head sniffing for the scent of his family. As a mother my heart wrenched for this poor gosling and as I witness this, I never thought about animals getting lost, like human children do. After watching him toddle into the bush we went about our way taking a lovely hike to a serene clearing.

Standing there taking in the beauty of the boreal forest, marsh and highland surrounding us, I began to understand why it's important to let nature come to you. If you stay still and quiet, it magically appears and you get caught up in the simple joys of rediscovering what it feels like to be a child again, seeing it all for the first time. I felt a sense of fufillment and thankfullness for being able to experience what is intended for us to enjoy.

Poplar Ridge getting ready for play

fter two seasons of construction, the 6,600 yard championship course at Poplar Ridge Golf Course and Housing Development will be opening on July 12.

The development is located at Onanole and, in addition to the golf course, it features 60 fully serviced residential lots ranging from one-half to fourfifths of an acre. All but four of the lots front onto the golf course which weaves through and around the lots.

The golf course incorporates aspects of the natural landscape including rolling hills, trees, water and meadows. The course aims to satisfy all golfers and each hole has three tees.

The course has some notable holes. At hole 11, players tee off from elevated tees, surrounded by trees and affronted by water. Hole 13 is a "near island" green, which is expected to give players the feeling of what the pros face at the Tournament Players Championship's 17th hole. Hole 8 is a tee shot across water expected to create a risk/reward situation for players.

In addition to the golf course, the development also features a driving range.

The course's superintendent is Ryan Myers, who joined the Poplar Ridge Management team the spring of 2008. Myers began his career in golf course maintenance in 1993

at Morden's Minnewasta Golf Course. After obtaining his diploma in advanced turfgrass management technology at Fairview College in 1999, he has been extensively involved in building golf courses throughout Canada and the U.S. Ryan came to Poplar Ridge from Sirocco Golf Club in Calgary.

The course's head professional is Shawn Woods, who was the head professional/ manager of the Neepawa Golf and Country Club from 1997 to 2008. Woods has been a Class A Professional since 1994 and has also worked at the Moonlake and Saskatoon Golf and Country Clubs and the Rock Creek Golf Club.
